Library Musings

LET'S PLAY A GAME. How well do you know your Library?

First up, how is the Springfield-Greene County Library District funded? I took an informal poll while walking through the stacks at the Library Center. Several people said sales tax, others thought state money and a few didn't know. Our library district is 90% funded by Greene County personal and real property taxes. Other revenues come from state aid, various taxes, library fines, copy machines and, unique to our district, income as a passport acceptance facility.

Next, what are some of the challenges that libraries are facing? Several items top the list, including book banning, funding challenges and increased usage by individuals experiencing homelessness. Libraries are for everyone, and we take pride in our vast and diverse collection, which reflects our commitment to inclusivity. In 2023, our district saw only nine reconsideration requests. We are fortunate since our peer institutions are facing higher numbers of requests. We firmly believe that parents/guardians should decide what their children read.

Funding challenges include maintaining our ten branches and expanding in markets where increased demand exists. Our facilities need refurbishment and upkeep due to age and use. We also monitor the rising cost of electronic resources daily. We know of another library facing potential branch closures because of publisher-set pricing on e-books and digital downloads. They are currently considering a tax levy increase to contend with the increasing demand and higher expenses. Your library is frugal, and we have not sought a tax levy increase in over 20 years. We also have limits on electronic resources that have allowed us to stay within our budget. Lastly, minimum wage increases are needed but also affect our budget greatly as over half of our staff are working part-time.

Lastly, libraries are experiencing an increasing number of individuals facing homelessness and mental health challenges in our role as a safe haven facility. Sometimes, individuals seeking refuge from the weather or facing homelessness may bring existing challenges into the library. We offer social worker services and enhanced security measures to assist people experiencing mental health challenges and/or substance use issues. Our staff often connects individuals to various service agencies in our community in addition to their library duties.

As you can see, there are challenges, but your Library team is working hard to provide the quality service you have come to expect. Libraries are essential to our community's future.

"Check Out the Stars" This Fall at the Library

This fall, we are thrilled to offer a unique opportunity to our patrons with a library card in good standing. Check out the stars with a telescope from one of four library branch locations: the Library Center, the Library Station, the Schweitzer Brentwood Branch Library and the Republic Branch Library. Telescopes will be checked out for two weeks and come with an instruction manual, a headlamp and a constellation guide. They will be available on a first-come, first-served basis and cannot be placed on hold.

Check Out the Stars is presented in partnership with the Springfield Astronomical Society (SAS), which has met monthly at the Library Center since 1999. The mission of the Springfield Astronomical Society is to increase understanding and appreciation of astronomy among amateurs. The SAS supports this project by modifying the telescopes to prepare them for checkout, contributing content to the user manual, curating resources and assisting with long-term telescope maintenance and repair.

Planning and Development Librarian Katie Hopkins wrote the grant and started the program in memory of her grandmother, Jean Back, who bought her a telescope at a young age and taught her about the constellations. "Everyone should have an opportunity to get outside and experience the magic of the night sky," said Hopkins.

A grant from Bass Pro Shops provided funding for Check Out the Stars because, in addition to getting people outdoors, it has a major conservation education component—light pollution. Using a telescope makes you keenly aware of the impact of light pollution on our ability to enjoy the night sky. Language in the telescope user manuals explains how light pollution has devastating consequences for area wildlife by disrupting predictable day and night schedules.

What's New in Local History and Genealogy



THOUSANDS GATHERED at the Springfield National Cemetery on May 30, 1924 for Springfield's annual Decoration Day ceremony. The Springfield Boy Scout Band, directed by R. Ritchie Robertson, led veterans of the Civil War, the Spanish-American War, and the World War through the cemetery towards a speaker's stand where an invocation was given and patriotic songs were sung. Attorney Perry T. Allen provided a "stirring tribute" to the veterans and those who gave the last full measure of devotion to their country.

The above photograph documents this historic moment in Springfield's history. It shows the veterans of three wars, the Springfield Boy Scout Band, R. Richie Robertson, Lt. Col. Paul Frey, and countless other individuals. This photograph is the most recent addition to Local History's archival collection, which contains thousands of historic images from the Ozarks.


Powwow with the American Indian Center of Springfield








OZARKS WINTERTIME TALES AND YULETIDE TERRORS

BORROWING

Library Cards

- Library Cards are issued free to Greene County residents or those who pay property tax in Greene County. Complete an application at the checkout desk of any library. Identification and proof of current address are required. Those who pay property tax in Greene County, but do not live there, must bring a copy of their current Greene County property tax receipt.
- Those living outside Greene County may obtain a Non-resident Library Card for an \$80 annual fee per household.
- Individuals may apply online for a temporary library card by completing an online registration form at thelibrary.org/ temporarycard. Within seven days you must either email a valid form of ID and proof of current address to sgcl.verifv@ thelibrary.org or bring the required documents to any library branch to complete the registration process. This allows you to place physical materials on hold, access the Library's online databases and e-books, audiobooks, movies, music and magazines. Applications processed online will require cardholders to present a photo ID the first time the card is used to check out materials in person.
- College, vocational or university students living in Greene County in campus housing, but with a permanent residence outside of Greene County, may be issued a Library Card at no charge. Proof of campus address required.

Checkout Limits/Fines

- Library materials check out for three weeks; overdue fine is 10¢ per day, per item.
- The maximum fine is \$5 for each returned adult item and \$1 for each returned children's item.
- Items may be renewed for two additional loan periods if not reserved by someone else. Renew items in person, by phone or online at thelibrary.org/myaccount.
- There is a checkout limit of 50 items per card.
- Report lost or stolen cards promptly. Replacement cards are \$1 each.
