Musings from the Executive Director Ed Walton

SINCE JOINING the Springfield-Greene County Library District in July 2023, I have been drinking out of a firehose as I learn all the complexities of the amazing work your Library does day in and day out. I have also learned that we have tremendous community support. When I applied and interviewed for this position, I was already aware of the district's outstanding reputation in the library community. My admiration only grew once I got a peek behind the scenes at all the hard work our team puts in every day to make everything we do noteworthy. A few examples:

- Did you know that it takes all year to put together the Summer Reading **Program?** The Youth Services team starts planning in September for the launch the following June. They spend hours reviewing program attendance, survey results and evaluating book inventories. Their goal is for children to earn a book they want, not just any book. Thanks to the Friends of the Library, who fund the Summer Reading Program, we are able to host Fantastic Friday events, educational and entertaining performers, and buy thousands of books.
- Did you know that our Community Relations Department spends three months preparing each issue of Bookends? The staff enters programs; our copywriter spends hours editing and proofing before the design team begins to work their magic and turn our publication into a community treasure. We print 8,000–10,000 issues, and they are usually gone before the next issue hits the stands.
- Did you know that the Collections Services team processes approximately 4,000 titles a month? In an effort to offer you a balanced collection of materials, as well as the bestsellers that everyone wants to check out, two staff members balance the digital content. They purchase licenses for the e-books and e-audiobooks that people download from Libby and Hoopla. These materials are more expensive than print books, so we balance supply and demand while staying within our budget. This year's collections budget is \$2,843,749.
- **Did you know we have ten facilities?** The upkeep and maintenance of our facilities is an incredible task. We welcomed 1,191,365 patrons to our libraries last year and with that amount of traffic, we have a team that works tirelessly to make sure the temperature is just right, the plumbing is working and the lights are on. We also have approximately 400 computers throughout the system and the IT department wants to make sure you have a good experience when using our public computers and also when checking out materials.

I have only touched the surface of the many roles located throughout the district. Our team is incredibly dedicated to our vision of being a thriving library that is an integral part of the lives of the community. After all, we are THE Library and YOUR Library.

Written through the lives of these extraordinary children and their caretaker, "The House in the Cerulean Sea" offers a moving reminder that love, acceptance and found family can open the door to a future full of hope and new beginnings. Come together in this annual community read event to hear the author discuss his acclaimed novel — a story of belonging, transformation and the power of embracing differences.

About "The House in the Cerulean Sea": At forty, Linus Baker leads a quiet and solitary life. As a Case Worker for the Department of Magical Youth, he dedicates his days to ensuring the welfare of children living in government-run orphanages. BORROWING

Library Cards

- Library Cards are issued free to Greene County residents or those who pay property tax in Greene County.
 Complete an application at the checkout desk of any library. Identification and proof of current address are required.
 Those who pay property tax in Greene County, but do not live there, must bring a copy of their current Greene County property tax receipt.
- Those living outside Greene County may obtain a Non-resident Library Card for an \$80 annual fee per household.
- Individuals may apply online for a temporary library card by completing an online registration form at thelibrary.org/ temporarycard. Within seven days you must either email a valid form of ID and proof of current address to sgcl.verifv@ thelibrary.org or bring the required documents to any library branch to complete the registration process. This allows you to place physical materials on hold, access the Library's online databases and e-books, audiobooks, movies, music and magazines. Applications processed online will require cardholders to present a photo ID the first time the card is used to check out materials in person.
- College, vocational or university students living in Greene County in campus housing, but with a permanent residence outside of Greene County, may be issued a Library Card at no charge. Proof of campus address required.

Checkout Limits/Fines

- Library materials check out for three weeks; overdue fine is 10¢ per day, per item.
- The maximum fine is \$5 for each returned adult item and \$1 for each returned children's item.
- Items may be renewed for two additional loan periods if not reserved by someone else. Renew items in person, by phone or online at *thelibrary.org/myaccount*.
- There is a checkout limit of 50 items per card.
- Report lost or stolen cards promptly. Replacement cards are \$1 each.
