Sylvia Martin, general file clerk, is vacationing in Memphis, Tenn., New Orleans, La., Ft. Worth and Ranger, Texas.

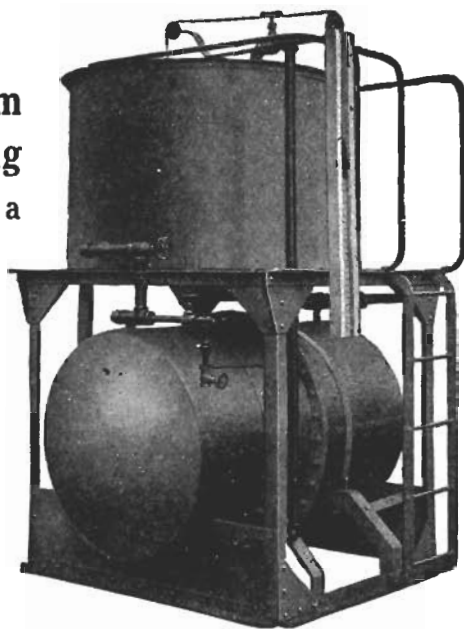
**RISSEK AND SMITH**

G. D. Shreeve, second trick switch tender, visited his son and family who reside at Centralia, Illinois, which

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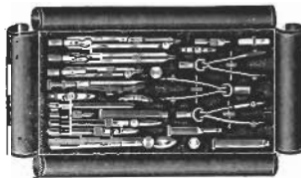

Work on the new Arsenal Street viaduct over the Frisco Lindenwood-Gratiot yards is well under way, and is beginning to show evidence that it will

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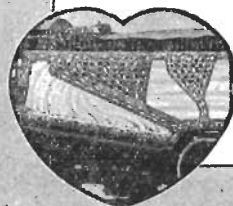
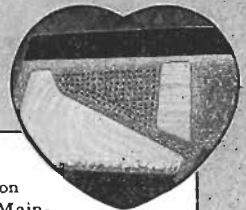
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
